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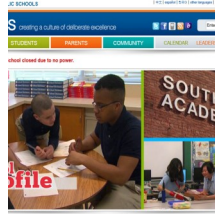

When protests turned into violence and outrage things really became intense. With the swift action on the part of the Baltimore City State's Attorney's Office in charging the officers involved in Freddie Gray's death and the violence subsiding, most of the nation returned to business as usual.
